- https://wikishire.co.uk/wiki/Grangemouth Grangemouth was founded by Sir Lawrence Dundas in 1768 during the construction of the Forth and Clyde Canal. Originally under the name of Sealock,<sup>[2]</sup> which referred to the Forth and Clyde Canal and where it flowed into the River Forth.<sup>[3]</sup> The town was then renamed Grangeburnmouth and then finally Grangemouth, the present day name.<sup>[2]</sup> This refers to its position at the mouth of the Grange Burn which flows into the River Forth at this point.
